## *Seminarian Profile: Deacon Shawn Landenwitch*

Born on Cincinnati's west side, Deacon Shawn Landenwitch did not take the normal path to the seminary. He was raised primarily in Columbus, Ohio, before moving to northern Virginia for his high school career. After graduation, he enrolled at the University of Virginia's College of Business, where he was on the intercollegiate cycling team among other activities.

Upon completion of his college studies, and the contemplation of the next step in his

life, things started to get interesting. While he had a place reserved at Notre Dame Law School, something was telling him that this was not the place he was supposed to go. After much prayer and discernment he finally approached his parents and said: "I'm not going to Law School. In fact, I'm thinking of entering the seminary."

"Surprisingly, my parents were supportive and after a bit of time, encouraged me in this effort," Shawn states.

After completion of the Pre-Theologate program at Franciscan University in Steubenville, Shawn enrolled at Mount St. Mary's Seminary of the West in pursuit of the priesthood for the Archdiocese of Cincinnati, with an expected ordination date of May 2009.

As a future priest, he desires to be an example of Christ, living and present in the world, challenging others to be a disciple of Christ, as he himself strives to be a disciple. "It is with great humility that the priest stands *in persona Christi*, and he invites the faithful into a deeper relationship with God. I really wish to be a bridge between God and His people, that they may know the great love that He has for them. It is this love that has drawn me into the seminary and which I wish to show to the people whom I will serve in the future."

Shawn asks that people pray for their perseverance that the seminarians deepen their relationship with Christ so that others may come to that same relationship.

## *The Holy Father Speaks*

Responding to a question on vocations during a meeting with the US bishops, Pope Benedict XVI responded:

The ability to cultivate vocations to the priesthood and the religious life is a sure sign of the health of a local Church. There is no room for complacency in this regard. God continues to call young people; it is up to all of us to encourage a generous and free response to that call. On the other hand, none of us can take this grace for granted.

In the Gospel, Jesus tells us to pray that the Lord of the harvest will send workers. Only the Lord can give the workers, and we always have to pray that He gives us the workers. He even admits that the work-

ers are few in comparison with the abundance of the harvest (cf. Mt 9:37-38). Strange to say, I often think that prayer - the *unum necessarium* - is the one aspect of vocations work which we tend to forget sometimes or to undervalue!

Nor am I speaking only of prayer for vocations. Prayer itself, born in Catholic families, nurtured by programs of Christian formation, strengthened by the grace of the sacraments -- prayer is the first means by which we come to know the Lord's will for our lives. To the extent that we teach young people to pray, and to pray well, we will be cooperating with God's call. So I think learning prayer, being prayerful people, is an essential point for the living

church. Programs, plans, projects are necessary and have their place; but the discernment of a vocation is above all the fruit of an intimate dialogue between the Lord and his disciples. Young people, if they know how to pray, can be trusted to know what to do with God's call.

I think there is a growing thirst for holiness in many young people, and that those who come forward show great idealism and much promise. It is important to listen to them, to understand their experiences, and to encourage them to help their peers to see the need for committed priests and religious, as well as the beauty of a life of sacrificial service to the Lord and his Church -- this is beautiful, to have a sacrificial service for the Lord and the Church.
